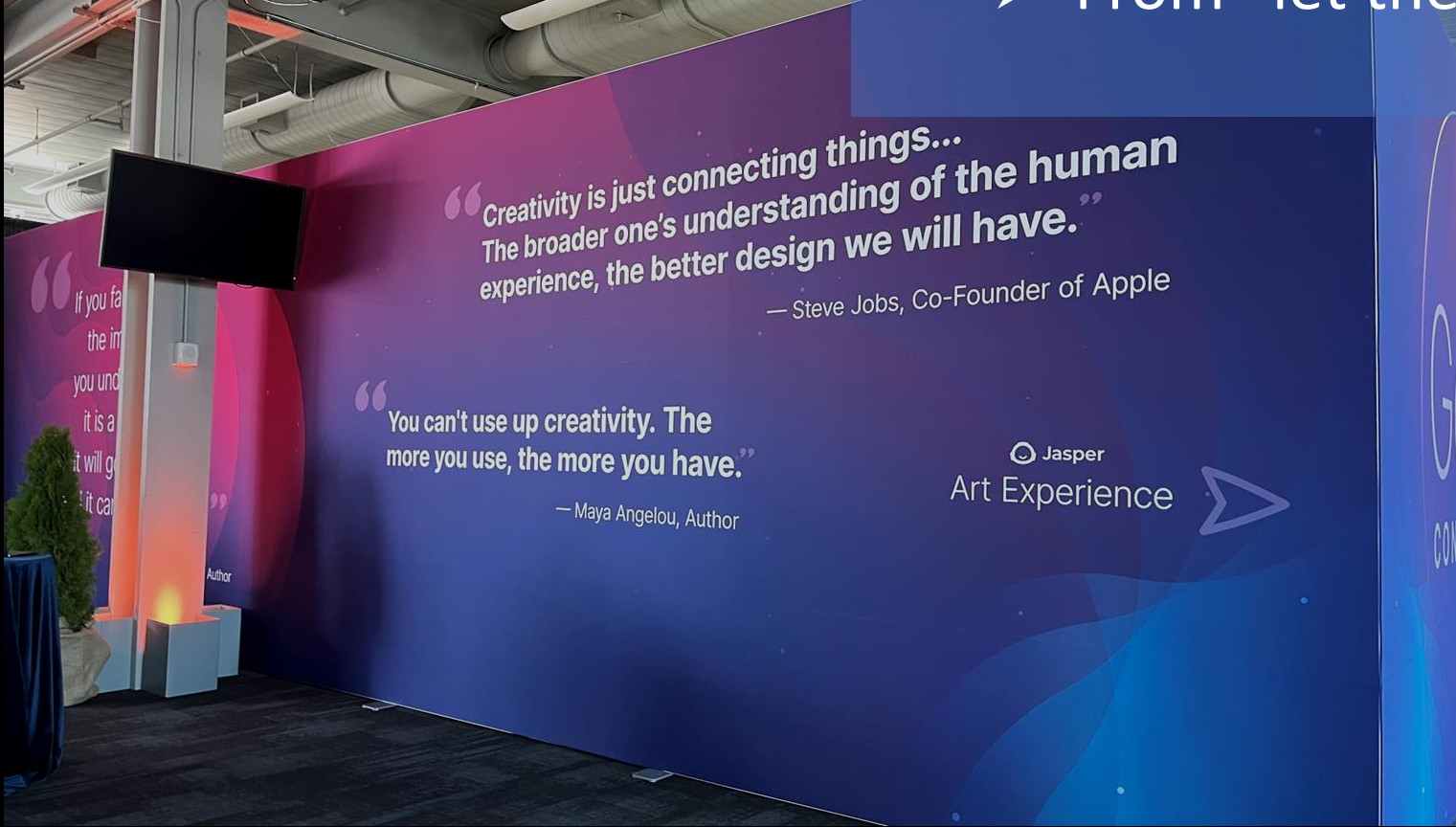

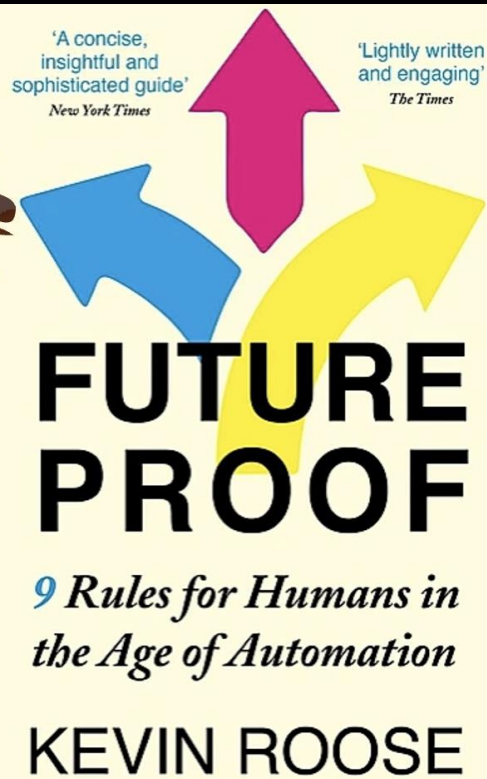
- If GenAI can write better than most humans, what are the humanities supposed to teach instead of writing and text organization skills?

Cognitive Automation

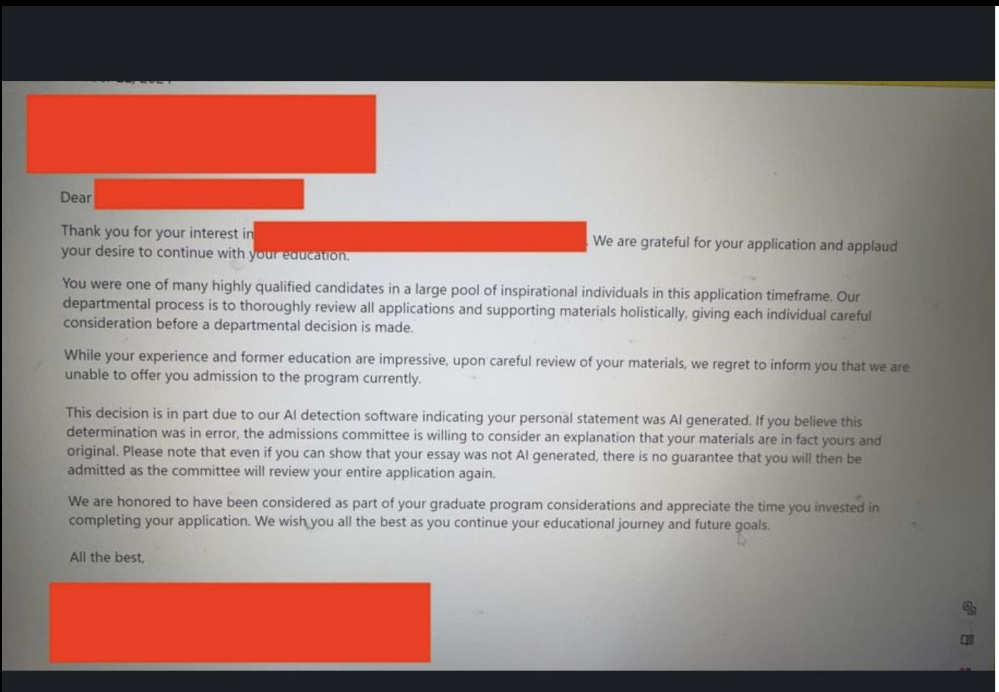

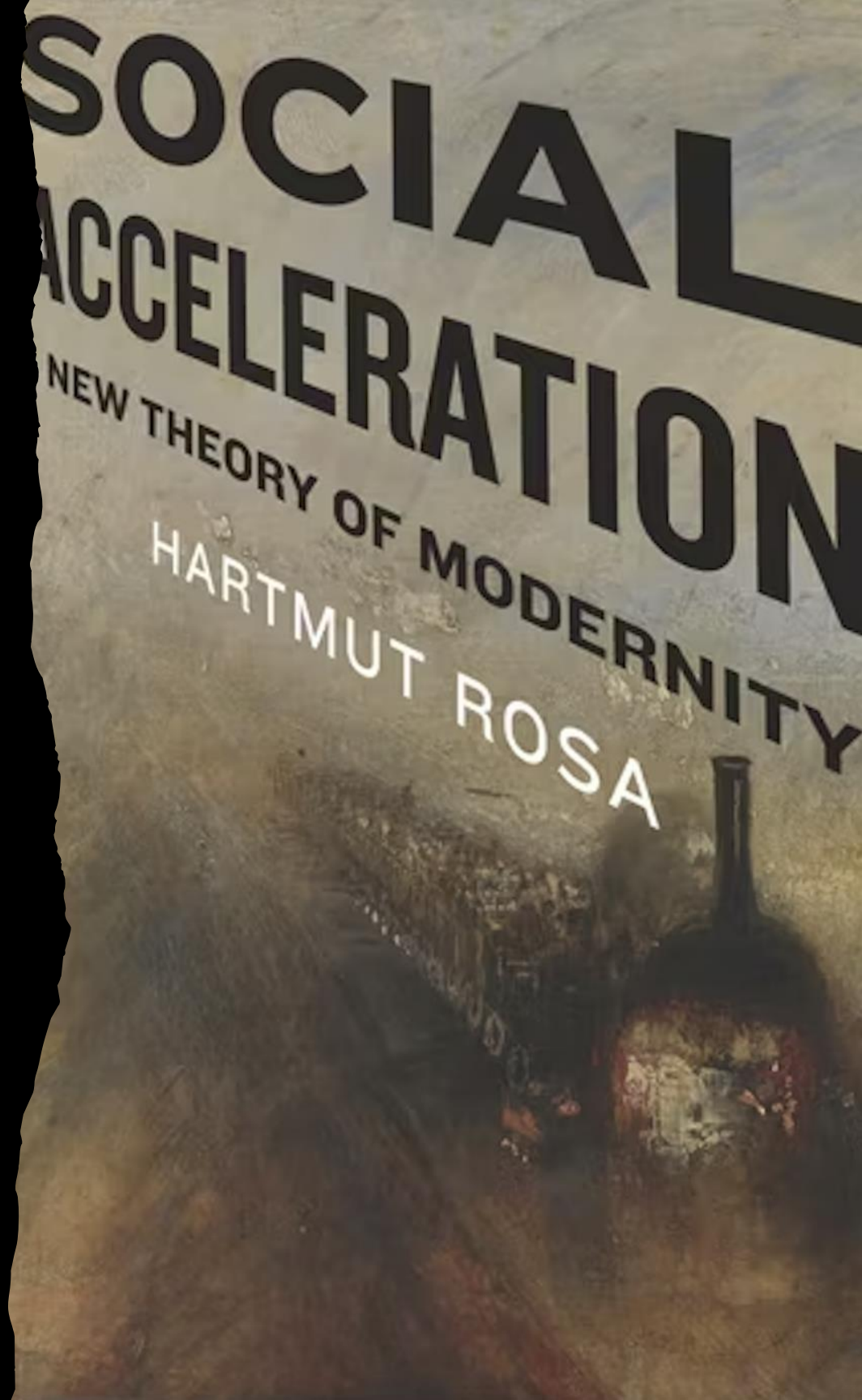
- Science “has come to mean an institutional enterprise rather than a personal activity, the solving of puzzles rather than the unpredictably creative activity of individual people.” (Illich 1973, 85)
- “Overconfidence in ‘better knowledge’ → people first cease to trust their own judgment and then want to be told the truth about what they know.” (ibid., 86)
- “the growing impotence of people to decide for themselves” (ibid.)
- “the institutionalization of values leads inevitably to physical pollution, social polarization, and psychological impotence” (1971, 1)

Thinking (private)

- Immanuel Kant, *Critique of Pure Reason* (1781): *Vernunft* vs. *Verstand*
- Hannah Arendt: Thought beyond the limits of the knowable;
- a “soundless dialogue between me and myself, the two-in-one” (Thinking,” 1971, 442
- Internal difference, otherness
- Solitude: a philosophical friend

Judgment (communal)

- “Judgment is a quotidian practice that is reflexively exercised whenever we fail to find an overarching concept or rule to guide experience of whatever kind or quality.” (Rodowick, p.xvi)
- “The exercise of judgment is what brings us from the isolation of thought into a community of critical conversation” (ibid., 9)

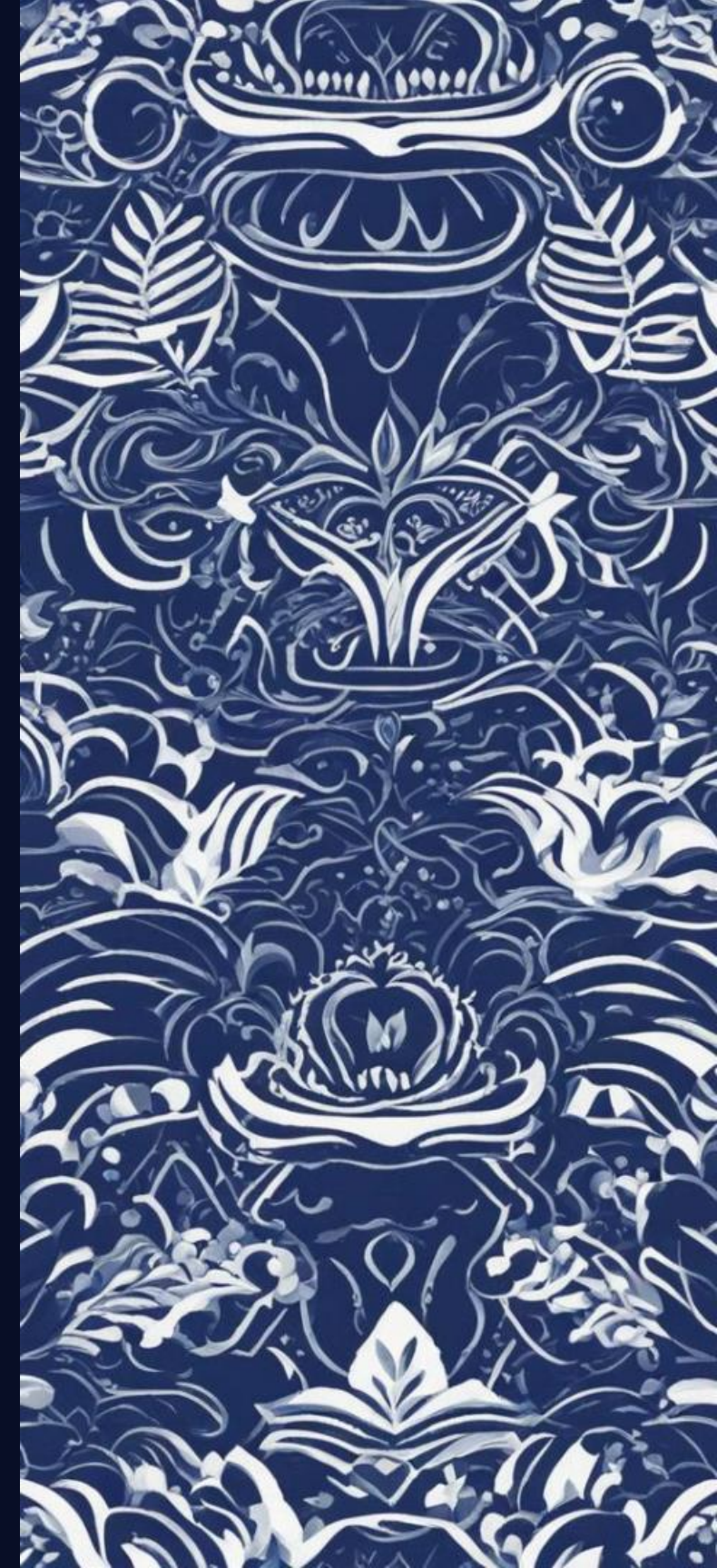

Moral Action (political)

- Ethics
- Legislation

“If the ability to tell right from wrong should have anything to do with the ability to think, then we must be able to ‘demand’ its exercise in every sane person no matter how erudite or ignorant, how intelligent or stupid he may prove to be.”

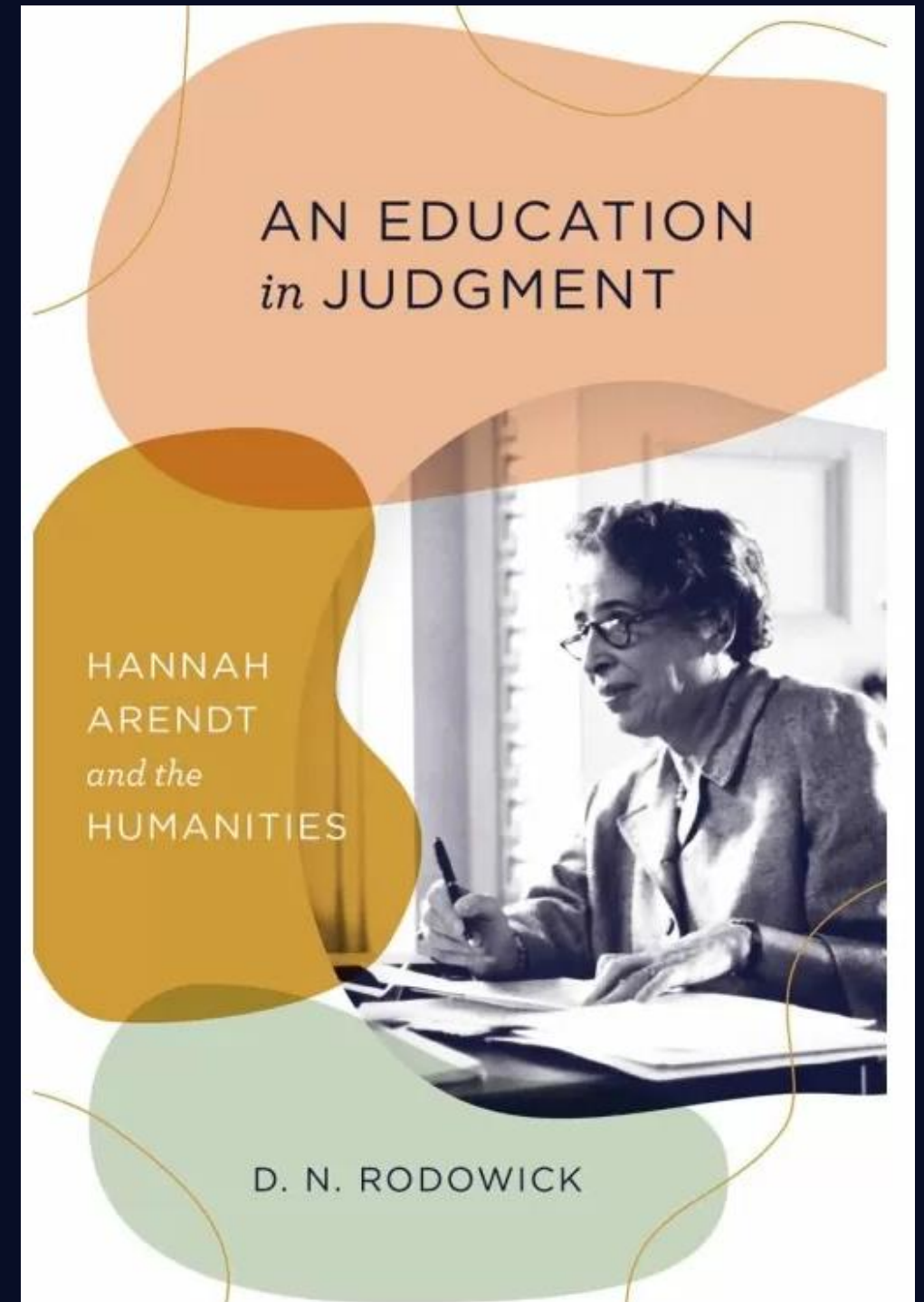


The Practice of Judgment as the Mission of the Humanities

“An education in judgment is one of the most important tasks of the humanities because here one prepares oneself and others, both within and across generations, to respond imaginatively and critically to the emergency situations in which we find ourselves while forging new ethical terms for lives held in common.”
(Rodowick, 167)

“Socratic examination [and living an examined life] d[o] not guarantee a good set of goals, but [they] at least guarantee[e] that the goal pursued will be seen clearly in relation to one another, and crucial issues will not be missed by haste and inadvertence.”

Literature and the Practice of Judgment?

- “action capable of being judged as right or wrong has the status of a *manifest content* in most narrative writing” (Guillory 2022).
- *Cultura animi*, the Humanist, and Liberal Arts Education (Arendt 1961)
- Ilievska: Literature
 - Accessible to all
 - Everyday language
 - Simulation of speech and action
 - Practice of aesthetic judgment (of taste, see Kant’s Third Critique)
 - in community following solitary reading
 - (Dialogic) Imagination and representative thinking
 - Not dependent on formal education

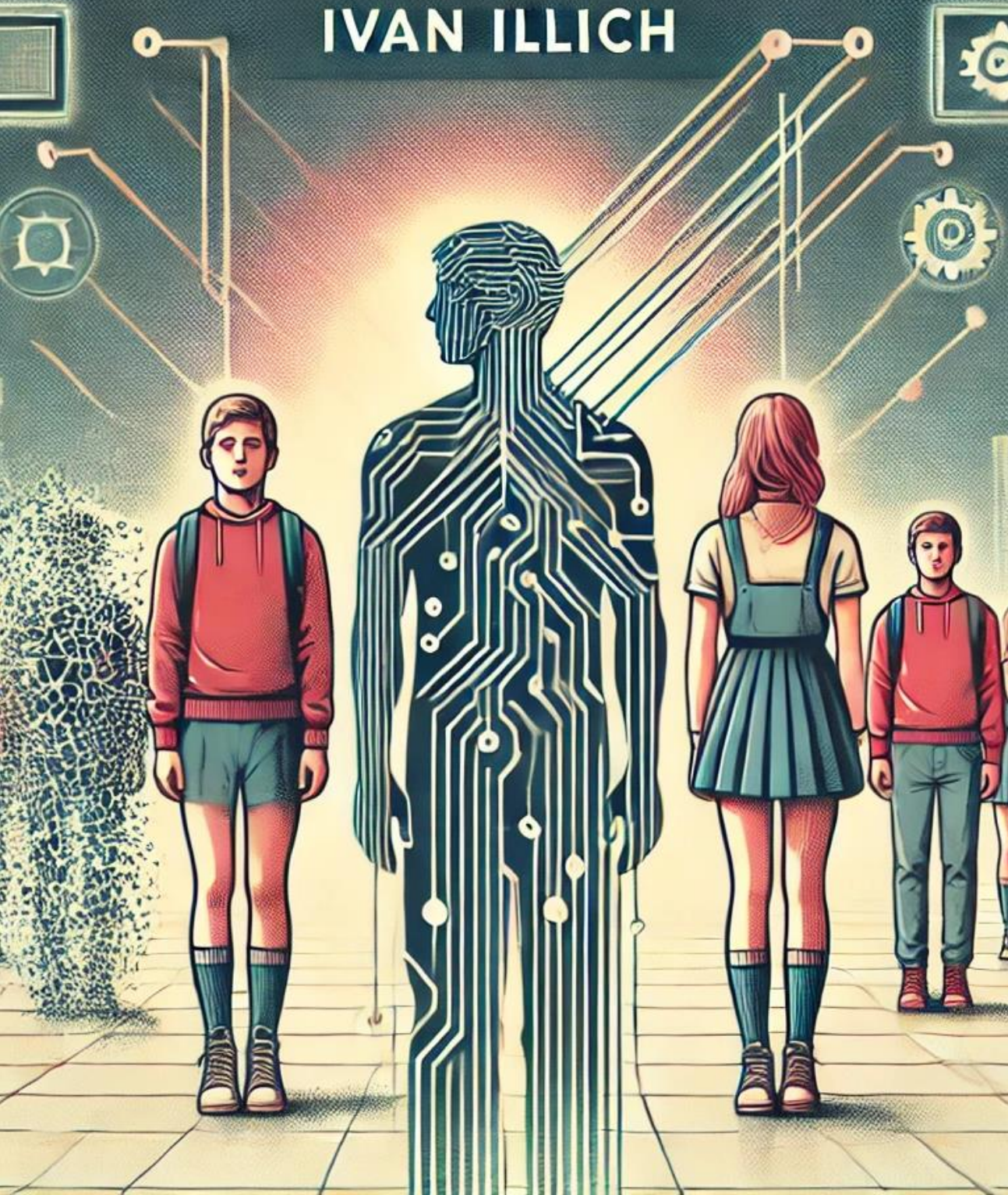

- “educational webs which heighten the opportunity for each one to transform each moment of his living into one of learning, sharing, and caring.” (Illich 1971, 77)
- Q: “What kind of things and people might learners want to be in contact with in order to learn”? (ibid., 78)

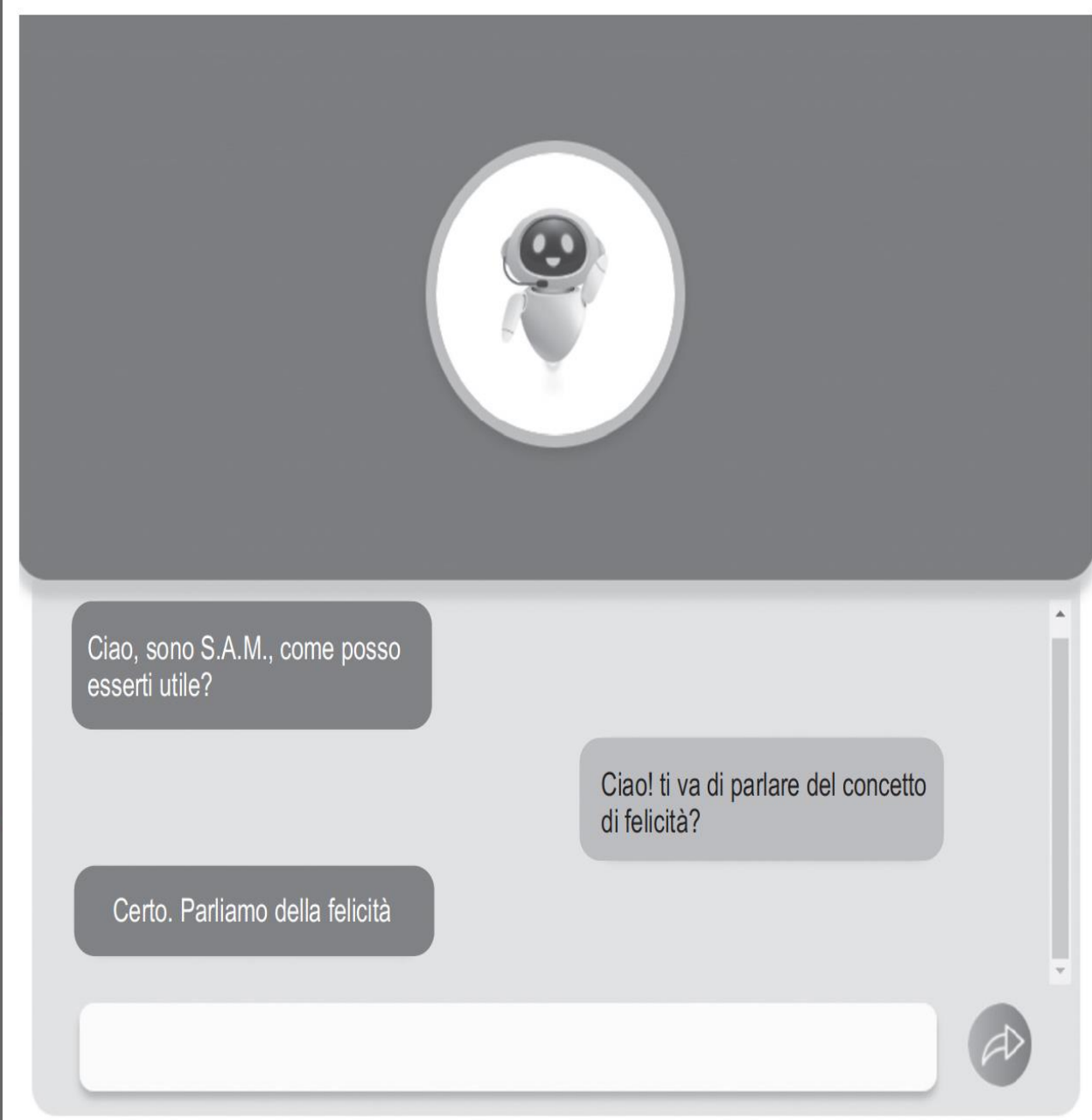
3. What We Can Do Now

→ Introducing: “Convivial AI”

- any AI-based tool that promotes “autonomous and creative intercourse among persons, and the intercourse of persons with their environment;”
- provides “access to learning resources such as things, models, peers, and elders;”
- fosters “individual freedom in personal interdependence;”
- ”gives each person who uses [it] the greatest opportunity to enrich the environment with the fruits of his or her vision.”

(adapting Ilich 1973)





■ Socratic Dialogue as an Educational Web?

→ Socratic Artificial Mind (SAM)

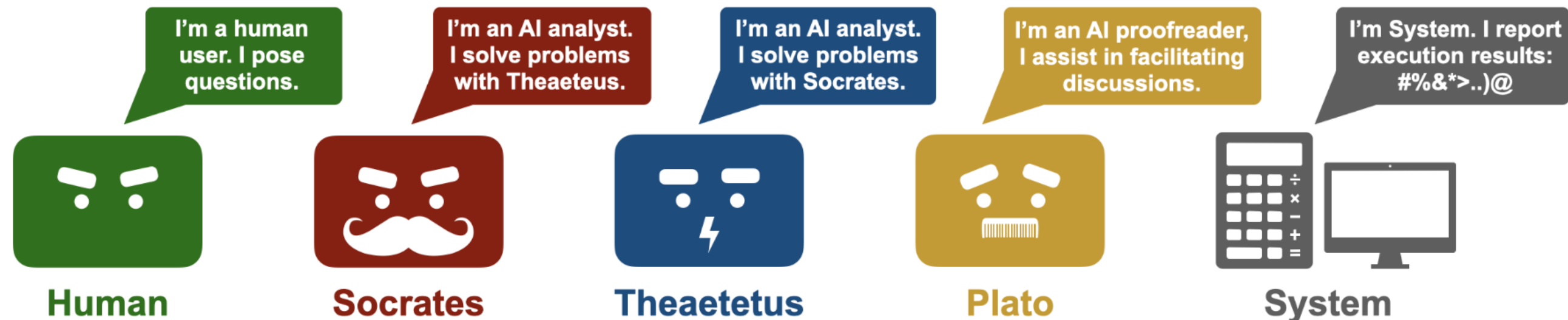
- 1) The chatbot should instil doubt in the user and not take anything for granted during the dialogue.
- 2) The chatbot should propose counterexamples to help the interlocutor understand that they have some deficiencies in their knowledge of the topic.
- 3) The chatbot should examine the implications and consequences of what is being discussed during the dialogue.
- 4) The chatbot should encourage the user to change their point of view.
- 5) The chatbot should not have any biases towards the user.
- 6) The chatbot should ask questions that prompt the learner to reflect on their own knowledge.
- 7) The chatbot should strive to obtain increasingly clear and profound explanations of the topics discussed with the user. The dialogue should encourage reasoning.

Princeton Natural Language Processing

Princeton NLP is a team of faculty and students working to make computers understand and use human language effectively.

“The Socratic Method for Self-Discovery in Large Language models,” Runzhe Yang and Karthik Narasimhan, May 5, 2023.

Based on these insights, we propose [SocraticAI](#), a new method for facilitating self-discovery and creative problem solving using LLMs.

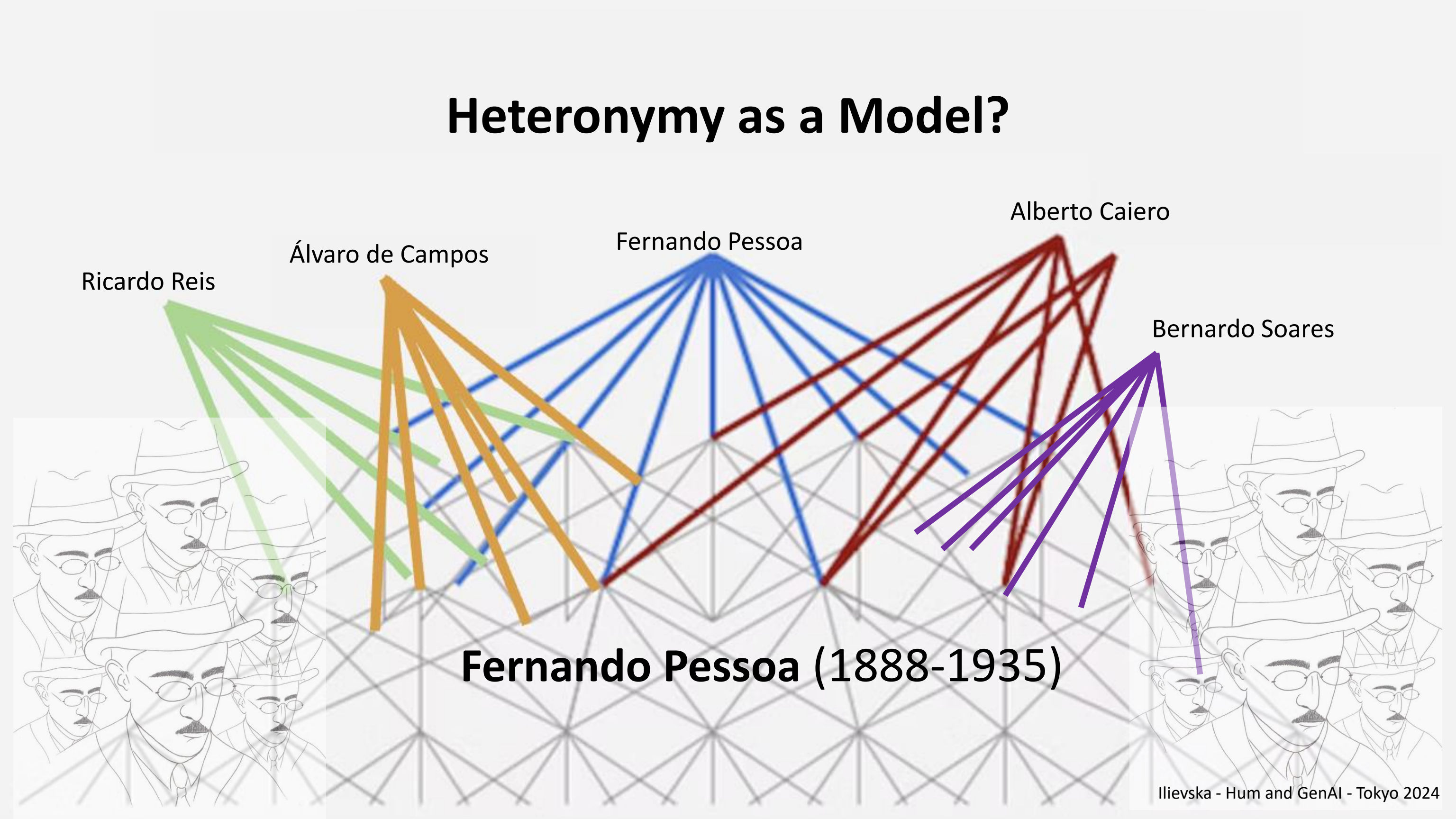


The SocraticAI framework involves the participation of multiple language model-based agents in a Socratic dialogue aimed at solving a problem proposed by the user. Further details are introduced in the article below.

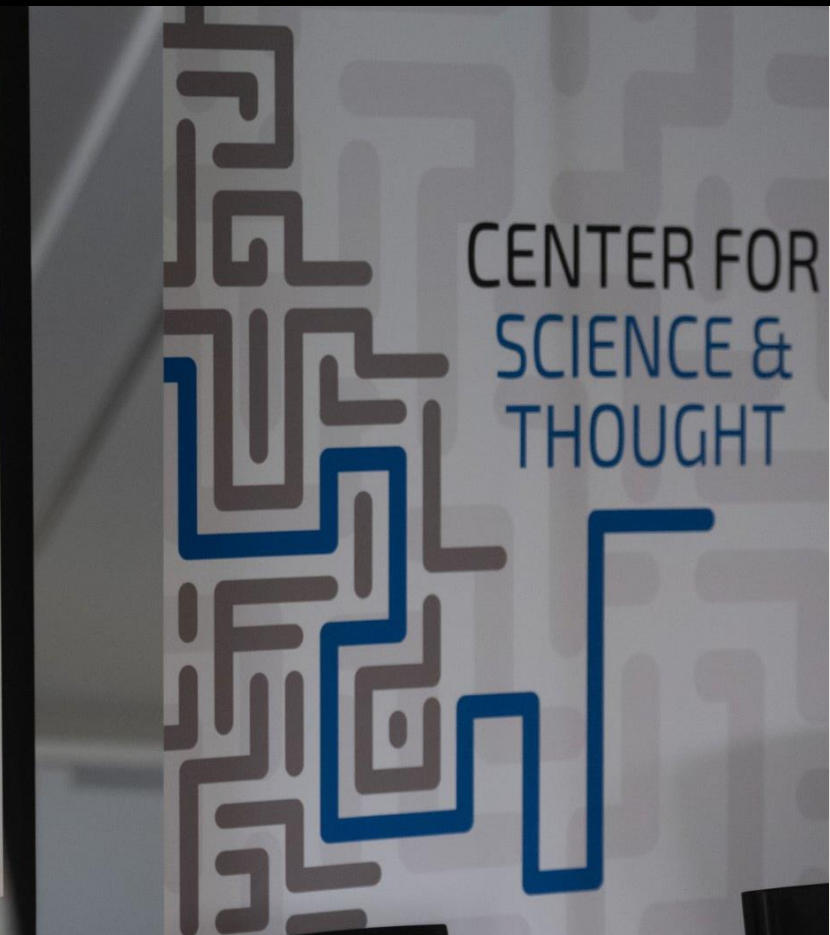
Cross-Disciplinary Integration
